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# 2010 Sunday Programs Set

On August 22 there will be an interesting program called, "Village to Village", featuring Juan Condori on cello and Ellie May Shufro on violin; they will give us a taste of music from different places.

September programs will include the returning "Six Basin Street Dixieland Band" on September 12, and again, the Old Town Museum Chorus on September 19. On October 3, the Old Town United Methodist Church will present a program on the church and on October 10, the Old Town Baptist Church will present a program.

In addition to these programs, the Museum will have some fund raisers which include a Strawberry Festival at the Museum on July 10, a supper at the Museum with entertainment in late July or early August, and finally a Harvest Tea on October 17. #### HISTORY AND INFLUENCE OF RELIGION IN OLD TOWN

## Medieval Works On Exhibit

A collection of original works based on the arts of the Middle Ages and Renaissance will be on special display at the Old Town Museum, on loan from individual members of the Endewearde branch of the Society for Creative Anachronism (SCA).

Among the diverse items on display are: a hand-painted stained glass piece in the style of the 13th century; a needle case featuring embroidery popular in Elizabethan England; a 16th century Flemish style woolen lady's gown, handsewn and modeled after those seen in paintings by Peter Bruegel the Elder; a hand carved falconer's whistle; SCA award scrolls based on numerous extant period documents; hand dyed and spun yarns and spinning implements; a steel helmet and articulated and decorated plate gauntlet; pewter castings and soapstone moulds; and a child's doll based on the Bayeux Tapestry.

Each item on display was created by a local member of the Society for Creative Anachronism, an international organization dedicated to researching and recreating the arts and skills of pre-17th century Europe. All of the items are handmade; none are manufactured.

The Shire of Endewearde hosts many activities and events in this region, from the Medieval Festival at Fort Knox to a weekend-long archery tournament in Newburgh; from a grand tourney and feast at the Brick Church in Bangor to a rough and raucous tavern brawl in our own "Bare Blade Tavern"; from weekly lessons in rapier and armored combat forms to evening gatherings for music, dance, medieval cookery, archery, and more.

The "Knowne World" of the SCA consists of 19 kingdoms, with over 30,000 members residing around the world. Members dressed in clothing of the Middle Ages and Renaissance attend events that feature tournaments, royal courts, feasts, dancing, various classes and workshops, and more. ### Maine's Civil War Monuments: Silent Sentinels

Are you a Civil War enthusiast? Many of us are very interested in the Civil War and the role Maine and its communities played in it. Did you know that Old Town has a Civil War monument? I was born here and have lived in Old Town sixty years and never knew we had a monument to our citizens who served in the Civil War!

The Old Town monument is located in Forest Hill Cemetery on Main Street. It was erected in 1906 by the Women's State Relief Corps of Old Town. The monument is visible from Main St. and is in



the southern end of the cemetery. The inscription states, "Erected A.D. 1906 By the Women's State Relief Corps of Old Town, in Memory of Our Soldiers, 1861-5."

I never would have discovered monument had it not been for a motice issued by the State of Maine. A new web site has been established to document Maine's involvement in the Civil War. The new site is still under construction, but the first phase of it is ready. That phase was a listing and photographs of all the monuments in Maine dedicated to those who served in the Civil War. The site can be viewed at www.maine.gov/ civilwar/sentinels.html. Much more data



is scheduled to be added on other areas of interest concerning the war according to Earle G. Shettleworth, Jr., Maine State Historian. According the Mr. Shettleworth the Maine Civil War Centennial Commission identified 74 monuments in Maine in a 1965 publication complied by Maurice J. Warner its chairman. Mr. Shettleworth has found an amazing 148 monuments to date and is still counting!

Please make a visit to the site and view some of these "silent sentinels" of our past. If you know of a monument that is not listed, Mr. Shettleworth would love to hear from you so that it can be added.
