Report of Acquisitions Committee by Eisso Atzema



The task of the Acquisitions Committee is not just to take in any items offered to the Museum. Indeed, not all items serve the mission of the Museum and we cannot accept just any item that is brought to the Museum. This year, for instance, an offer of a very nice, late 19th century wood stove was declined because there was no connection to Old Town at all. For the same reason, we decided not to take in a 1930s upright piano even though it appeared to be in excellent condition.

Among the items that we did accept, a few stand out. Earlier this year, we received a collection of personal papers of Anna Wareing (1912-2009), a long-time elementary school teacher in Old Town. Items include school programs, student work, and teaching

materials, along with a number of Sunday School text books from the 1850s that were used in Old town.

One of the more curious

donations was an explosive cannon ball that was found in the Penobscot River near the Old Town Dam. It probably dates back to the Civil War era, but how it might have ended up in the river is unclear.

As every year, the Museum received several photographs of former Old Town public figures. This year's crop included a set of photographs of former police chief Otis LaBree (1915-2003) . Provided they are well-documented, such photographs are always welcome.

The Acquisitions Committee has also been working on streamlining the acquisitions process and the recording of items that were acquired, but have yet to be included in the catalog. We now have an electronic database that ultimately should include a rudimentary record of every new item. This database will by no means replace the Museum catalog, but hopefully it will allow us to include new items in the Museum catalog on a more systematic basis

2015 Programs Draw Good Audiences, Offer Enthusiastic Entertainment

The Old Town Museum Program Series for 2015 began in March with an evening presentation on the early railroading history of Old Town, at the Old Town Library. We are thinking of adding some other evening programs to our schedule in the future, so if this is something you think you would enjoy, please let us know.

The Opening Sunday Program for the season in May, a kick-off of Old Town's 175th anniversary celebration, featured several community members sharing poems, essays and songs written through the years by Old Town High School students and other residents of the area. Our readers were excellent and while some selections were humorous, others were quite touching, making for a very entertaining afternoon.

For Flag Day, the Old Town Museum Chorus, led by Pam Martin, treated us to a program of patriotic songs.

In July, Joe and Sue Cyr presented a history of John T. Cyr & Sons, which was one of the highlights of our season, and Duane Prugh, who teaches many interesting Senior College courses in the Augusta area, told us all about Maine's Giant Trees.


In August, Dr. Hal Borns introduced us to a mid-19th century unpublished manuscript, written by a Vinalhaven doctor, that, had it been published at that time, would have greatly influenced the debate about how our landscape was formed.

September brought us Kevin Johnson from the Penobscot Marine Museum, sharing images from the Eastern Illustrating Co. collection of glass plate negatives. Later in the month, Richard Grady, who lived in Old Town as a young man and graduated from Old Town High School, shared his memories of our community and how his years here had influenced him throughout his life.

We wrapped up the season with a rousing concert by the Six Basin Street All Women Dixieland Band. We continue to plan our 2016 program schedule, which will be available on our website (www.theoldtownmuseum.org) and our Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/Old-Town-Museum-82802006819/) in early spring.

We're looking forward to learning more about the history of our local communities and the state of Maine and hope you will join us in the adventure.

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like in Old Town when their parents and even their grandparents were their age. We had hoped to be able to expand these school tours to the Milford Third-grade this year but it did not occur, possible next Spring.
